RESEARCH ACTIVITIES:

March 1, 2008

Principle investigator, Moral Reasoning in Medicine Project. Co-investigator, Richard Sprott, PhD. A multi-year survey of the ethical decisions made by medical residents responding to clinical cases describing an ethical dilemma. The residents complete the questionnaire on the first day of their internship and again one year later. The goal is to measure changes in way they respond to ethical problems after their first year of medical training beyond medical school.

Principle investigator, Staff Ethics Survey (SES). Co-investigators, James McGaughey, Robert Pearlman, MD, MPH, and Albert Jonsen, PhD. 1,860 randomly selected clinical and managerial staff were surveyed, in the winter of 2005, in an effort to assess their level of ethical knowledge and their attitudes about ethical care practices such as respect for privacy, appropriate end of life care, openness to shared decision-making and, a fair allocation of medical resources. The results have been analyzed and presented to California Pacific Medical Center's Senior Management.

Principle investigator, Proactive Ethics Intervention (PEI). Co-investigators, Lawrence Schneiderman, M.D. and Albert Jonsen, PhD. This study will measure the impact of a clinical ethics team evaluation for patients who remain hospitalized in the intensive care unit for at least five days. The intervention will be monitored for clinical outcomes; including survival and length of stay, as well as perceptions of quality by survivors and caregivers. Patient enrollment began in September, 2007.
